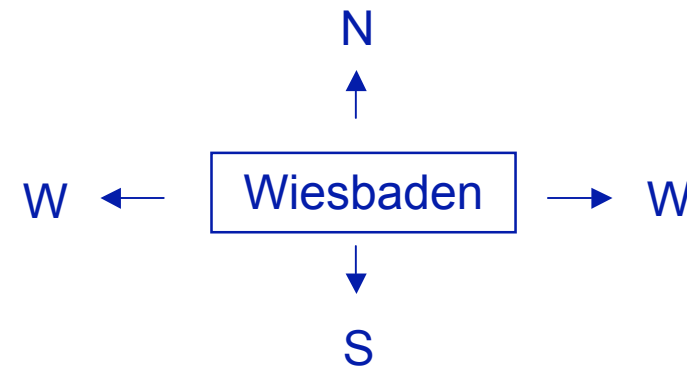


1. Getting to know each other

2. Topic & objectives – Part I

Working groups



Question: One group on each topic (i.e. Culture, Identities & Integration) or all groups on all topics?

Step 1: **Identification of problems** – What are the main issues/challenges for young people (5 min individual brainstorming)

Step 2: **Prioritization** – Discuss issues/challenges in the groups and prioritize (each person has three points to allocate)

Step 3: **Development of solutions and strategies** – Problem Tree



Problem Tree

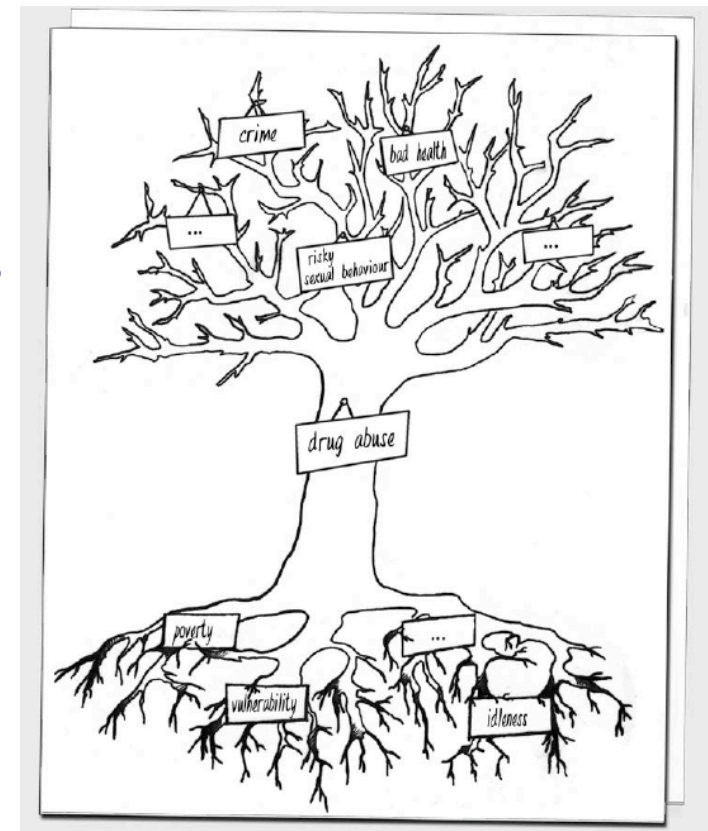


Objectives:

1. Analyse problems young people face
2. Identify their causes & consequences
3. Discuss solutions & strategies

Explanation:

The trunk represents the problem, the roots the causes (“root causes”) and the branches the consequences.





Problem Tree



- Step 1:** Take a poster per group, markers, cards and glue and draw a problem tree on your poster. On one card you should write the problem you are analysing and glue it on to the trunk.
- Step 2:** Discuss what the causes of the problem are and to draw each cause on a card and stick it on to the roots.
- Step 3:** Discuss the consequences of the problem for young people, draw each consequence on a card and stick it on to the branches.
- Step 4:** Discuss how the problems could be addressed by activities and services. You can write the solutions and strategies you come up with on to the poster and connect it with arrows to the problem or the consequences.



Problem Tree



Guiding questions:

1. Which problems of young people that we have analysed earlier do you feel are the most important?
2. How can these problems be solved best?
3. In which processes does the participation of youths needs to be improved?
4. Which activities and services do you feel are best suited to tackle these problems?

Come up with a sentence for the resolution that encapsulates your main demands and wishes.



Setting priorities
